

2024 NATIONAL CORVETTE CARAVAN

Every Five years Corvettes a special event happens for Corvette owners. Caravans begin in all states, first at the club level then joining other clubs at the state level, finally joining the other caravans from all over the country arriving, at Bowling Green Kentucky. Bowling Green is the home of the National Corvette Museum and the Corvette Assembly Plant. Over the 2024 Labor Day weekend, August 29 to August 31, 2024. Celebrating the 30th Anniversary of the Museum.

The Venice Florida Corvettes Club caravan is in the early stage of planning for the 2024 event. For past caravans VFC to this event have been either two or three travel days. The three travel days caravans include a stop on the first day at a location where they can enjoy their corvettes. One time the stop was at the Sebring racetrack. 10 Corvette Facts You Probably Don't Know (But should)

Over 70 years and 8 generations, there are a ton of interesting Corvette facts for fans to learn about. Here are 10 most people don't know!

1. The 1963 Split-Window's 1930s Germany Inspiration



Becoming a member of the Corvette family -- as a fan or an owner -- is a gateway to seven decades of engineering, design, performance, and fun little anecdotes that tend to be forgotten over the course of eight unique generations. So the editorial team and I thought it would be fun to highlight 10 Corvette facts that most people probably don't know.

To start, let's talk about the 1963 Corvette Sting Ray splitwindow. Everyone knows (or should know) the splitwindow was only produced for a single model year. As it turns out, the most beautiful American car ever designed... was a bit unsafe in terms of rearward visibility. What you might NOT know, however, is the story of how the iconic split window design was inspired by an ultra-rare car that was produced in 1930s Germany and later brought back to the States as a "spoil" of World War II.

According to Director of Design **Dave Holls**, the GM design team borrowed a **1938 Adler Trumpf Rennlimousine** in the summer of 1959 for a photography session. Apparently, SVP of Design, **Bill Mitchell** later saw these photos, gave them to C2 designer **Larry Shinoda**, and said, "This is what I want."

2. The Original Corvette Logo was ILLEGAL



Designed by Robert Bartholomew, the original Corvette logo featured both an American flag and the checkered flag used in racing. However, the United States flag code (still) says, "The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever." So, despite what modern-day America looks like with U.S. Flags Anywhere Everywhere All At Once, 1950s GM executives pivoted to a logo that included the Chevrolet logo and the fleur de lis, which was rumored to be Louis Chevrolet's family crest.

3. The Corvette was Named After a WWII Warship



Today, mention the word Corvette and people are likely to picture a two-seat, American sports car. But, prior to the 1950s, the corvette was the name of a small, Flower-class World War II warship that itself was named after a 19th century class of wooden French warships. As described in the 1951 novel *The Cruel Sea*, by Nicholas Monsarrat, corvettes were "two hundred feet long, broad, chunky, and graceless: designed purely for anti-submarine work, and not much more than a floating platform for depth charges, she was the prototype of a class of ship which could be produced quickly and cheaply in the future, to meet the urgent demands of convoy escort." The corvette-warship name continues on through today.

4. Corvettes Used to be a LOT Cheaper



It's hard to look at old advertisements and not envy previous generations for the prices of new cars from bygone eras. Naturally, the process of inflation is the main difference between Then Prices and Today Prices. But even with inflation considered, Corvettes used to be a LOT more affordable. For example, the original base price for the 1953 Corvette was \$3,498, which is equivalent to about \$39,692.57 in 2023 (according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistic Inflation Calculator.) For reference, the average price of a new vehicle in February 2023 was \$48,763. And, of course, the base C8 Corvette now starts north of \$60,000. Although, to be fair, modern Corvettes offer a lot more in terms of luxury, technology, safety, and performance.

5. Sting Ray vs Stingray



If you're lucky enough to order a brand new C8 Corvette, the base model is lovingly dubbed the Stingray. This aquatic name/badging dates back to the XP-87 development car, aka the Stingray Racer. The C2 Corvette generation carried on the name from 1963 to 1967 as the **Sting Ray** (two words). Now, most people will argue that Sting Ray was only used to refer to C2 Corvettes. But here's the interesting part. When the C3 Corvette debuted in 1968 the Sting Ray badging was indeed missing. **But GM brochures actually continued referring to the 1968 Corvette as a Sting Ray**. For 1969, the badging returned as the (all-one-word) **Stingray** and remained through the 1976 model year. The Stingray name then took a break until 2014, with the debut of the C7.

6. The Only True 30th Anniversary Corvette



As discussed earlier, the Corvette debuted in 1953. So it was no surprise that Chevrolet wanted America's longest-running sports car to launch the new C4 generation ahead of its 30th anniversary. So the goal was set to launch the C4 in 1982. But the C4 was such a dramatic leap forward that numerous delays pushed its launch back. First to 1983. And then again to 1984. Which means, every single "1983 C4 Corvette" was technically a prototype "pilot assembly" vehicle. That's right, no 1983 Corvettes were manufactured for and sold to the public and the Corvette missed its own anniversary. And, of the 43 pilot assembly vehicles produced that year, only one survived. This lone 1983 Corvette was actually the fourth model built (on June 28, 1982) and you can see it at the National Corvette Museum.

7. Don't Stand So Close to Me



Approaching a modern vehicle with a key fob in your pocket is likely to set off a little light show while unlocking your doors and trunk(s). 30 years ago, things were very different. But as always, the Corvette was leading the way with new technology. The 1993 C4 Corvette was the first car to be equipped with a proximity key fob remote control. To be clear, key fob remotes with buttons to unlock the car were already pretty common on many vehicles. But this 1993 "experiment" was the first to allow drivers to simply approach their Corvette and have the doors unlock automatically. However, unlike modern fobs, you still had to use a physical key with your 1993 C4.

8. Magnetic Personality



The Corvette has long been an engineering testbed for new technologies that trickle down into other GM vehicles. Most notably this applies to performance engines as well as suspension components. Not only was the 1990 Corvette ZR-1 the first Corvette to feature a computercontrolled adjustable suspension, but the 2003 Corvette 50th Anniversary Edition was the first to feature magnetic selective ride control. Magnetorheological dampers -- often referred to as MagneRide or MagRide dampers -- are filled with a magnetic fluid that can be adjusted on the fly to a variety of firmness settings. Additionally, these systems -more so today -- are able to monitor current and road conditions and adjust the way the suspension reacts, which results not only improves performance but also offers a smoother more comfortable ride. And, for the Corvette, that technology debuted 20 years ago.

9. The C7 Corvette Could Have Been Mid-Engine



That's right, a full generation before the (pictured) C8 Corvette. Here's the story: when Corvette Executive Chief Engineer Tadge Juechter and team developed the C6 Corvette ZR1, it was the first supercharged Corvette in history. It was also the quickest. At the time, the engineers realized the future potential of Corvettes wouldn't be limited by power, but rather by traction. Therefore, from an engineering point-of-view, it was time to pivot to a C7 generation with a mid-engine layout that had been dreamt of since the days of **Zora Arkus Duntov**. But when GM went into bankruptcy during the financial crisis of 2008, Tadge and crew had to cancel those plans. In fact, the Corvette itself almost died during this time. But fortunately, one of the regulators brought in to help GM through bankruptcy was a Corvette fan, so the C7 -- an evolution of the C6 rather than a revolution -- became a way to not only save the Corvette but also GM itself.

10. I Can't Drive 55... In Reverse (But It's Pretty Close)



Generations of Corvette enthusiasts have drooled over benchmarks like quarter-mile and 0 to 60 times. But almost all of these facts and figures apply to Corvettes traveling forward. But it turns out that the C7 Corvette Stingray is actually reasonably quick in reverse. Sure, it can't actually do a 0-60 run. Nor can it drive 55 (much to Sammy Hagar's disappointment). But it can manage a whopping 54 mph in reverse, which helped a man named Scott Burner set a Guinness World Record last year.
